Thoughts From the Interim Pastor . . .

Dear friends,

Grace and peace to you.

The Pastor Nominating Committee of my Interim church in Suffolk, Virginia gathered nearly every Tuesday night, and each evening before the group began its meeting with prayer, the chairman would place the Committee's mascot on the table. It was a little plastic donkey, meant to remind them of the donkey Balaam rode when summoned to go and curse the people of Israel as they made their way to the Promised Land. Perhaps pre-occupied with many thoughts, hopes, options and concerns, Balaam did not see the angel of the Lord standing in the road with a sword in its hand and blocking Balaam's way. But the donkey did, and it left the road, walking into a field and making Balaam so angry that he struck the animal. Again and yet again the more perceptive donkey took steps to avoid the threatening angel. And when Balaam for a third time beat the animal, God "opened the mouth of the ass," giving it the ability to speak in words that Balaam would understand. It then helped its master realize there was something in their way, something he needed to attend to, yield to, obey... if he hoped to remain alive. Balaam then saw the sword-bearing angel. And I assume he apologized to his donkey (see Numbers 22).

By having such a mascot at its meetings, the PNC hoped that it would help the Committee keep looking and listening for God's

presence and direction as it moved along in its search. The Committee hoped that, if it came to a barrier, it would be reminded that sometimes stops and reversals are for the best. It hoped it would be inspired to trust that God was guiding its work. It hoped to be stimulated to accept God's direction and cooperate with God as faithfully as it could. The PNC had a fairly long and sometimes bumpy ride. But it never lost faith. It pursued its work with a great deal of prayer. And in time, it celebrated a happy conclusion to its journey. And you can be sure that when that arrival was celebrated, the mascot was given a place at the head table!

Recently your PNC reported on its efforts, its journey, on what it's anticipating and what it's hoping. As it considers candidates, and more crucially, as it seeks to discern how God is directing it, the Committee continues to need the support of your prayers, the expression of your faith that God is at work with it, and your willingness to be patient, and eager, but not anxious. We should have no doubt that God is with us in this interim journey. We should feel great desire to remain alert to God's promptings and engaged in responding to them. Someday there will be a celebration here. But, in fact, everyday with God some kind of celebration's called for... don't you think?

Attention: Bible Scholars and Sunday School Classes

The Education and Nurture Committee has purchased for the church two sets of DVDs suitable for individual or class study. Each set consists of 24 half-hour lectures sup-

ported by a leader’s guide and discussion questions.

The set on the Old Testament was written and presented by Professor Amy-Jill Levine of Vanderbilt Divinity School. The author of the New Testament series is Professor Bart D. Ehrman of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. In addition to the four canonic gospels and other books of the New Testament, there are discussions of the non-canonic Gospels, the “Historic Jesus—sources and problems, solutions and methods.” Each session is “freestanding” so individuals or classes can “pick and choose” what most interests them.

The DVDs can be checked out using the library book card method. Please comply so we can keep track of them so they are available to all who wish to use them. Copies of sections of the leader’s guide can be made at the church office.

FPC's Presbyterian Women organization has continued to send mission contributions to New Hope Presbytery, provided desserts for Meals-on-Wheels, served meals to families of deceased church members, and provided a scholarship for high school graduating senior Bethany Fillippeli.

In addition, the following projects were completed:

- ◆ Collected more than 100 pairs of socks for the Homeless Shelter
- ◆ Sent Campbell product labels to Barium Springs Home for Children
- ◆ Filled shoeboxes for Samaritan's Purse *Operation Christmas Child*
- ◆ Collected old all-purpose and Christmas cards for St. Jude's Ranch for Children
- ◆ Donated gently worn clothing for Cherry Hospital
- ◆ Gave Christmas gifts for residents at Cherry Hospital
- ◆ Collected \$865 on Blanket Sunday, which bought 173 blankets for Haiti
- ◆ Provided Mother's Day cards to be used by those who contributed to the blanket fund to honor "special mothers"
- ◆ Sent 2 Baby Layettes to Church World Service
- ◆ Gave \$250 to Smile Train for one complete surgery for a child who needs cleft reconstruction
- ◆ Mailed 272 Hygiene Kits to Church World Service done by PW circles before the Haiti earthquake; 100 additional Hygiene Kits were completed by the congregation after the earthquake for total of 372
- ◆ Sent 82 School Kits to Church World Service
- ◆ Prepared gift baskets for members in the hospital
- ◆ Decorated the church for Christmas and Easter

The Joy of Coloring

In his book *Dangerous Wonder*, the late youth-ministry pioneer Mike Yaconelli debunks the idea that Christianity is “all about coloring within the lines and coloring well.” He writes: “God’s grace is so outside the lines of our understanding that we can only stand in awe and wonder. Christianity is not about learning how to live within the lines; Christianity is about the joy of coloring. The grace of God is preposterous enough to accept as beautiful a col-



oring that anyone else would reject as ugly.

“The grace of God sees beyond the scribbling to the heart of the scribbler — a scribbler who is similar to two thieves who hung on crosses on either side of Jesus. One of the two asked Jesus to please accept his scribbled and sloppy life into the kingdom of God . . . and he did. Preposterous. And very good news for the rest of us scribblers.”

A Local Worshiping Trigger

What are your worshiping triggers? What are the things that, when seen, challenge you to worship God? The author of the Presbyterian Women study book “Joshua” says that the stones taken from the Jordan at Gilgal and the large stone erected at the sanctuary of God at Shechem were such objects.

When I see Larry (Landry) driving the church van into our driveway on Sunday mornings, I think of it as a worshiping trigger: God inspires his followers to help others. An ordinary car would serve as well, but the van is also an imagination trigger.

When Larry and Joe, the only male passengers, help us up into the van, we are no longer little old ladies en route to church. We are daughters of the King going to meet him. The van is a coach.

The van is also a chariot. We are warriors on the way to learn more about how to fight for righteousness.

The van is a means of sharing God’s love. Blessed are all who drive it.

FROSTY FRESH GRAPE POPS

Jesus is our vine, and we are to be his fruitful branches. Have "bunches" of fun making this refreshing grape snack.

What you need:

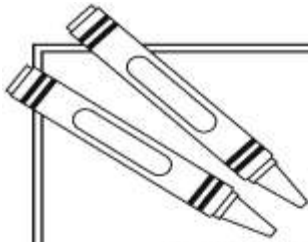
- An adult to help
- 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups seedless grapes (red, green or black)
- Food processor
- Plastic spatula
- Strainer
- Mixing bowl
- Whisk
- 2 teaspoons sugar
- Food coloring (red, green or blue; optional)
- 5 oz. paper cups
- Aluminum foil
- Popsicle or craft sticks
- Another 2 cups grapes, halved (optional)



What you do:

1. Blend grapes in a food processor until smooth.
2. With a plastic spatula, press mixture through a strainer into a mixing bowl. Discard skins and skim foam off the top.
3. Whisk sugar into juice until dissolved. Add a few drops of food coloring, if desired.
4. Fill cups with juice, spooning most of the foam off the top. (If using additional grapes, put $\frac{1}{2}$ -cup halved grapes into each cup.)
5. Cover each cup with foil and insert a wooden stick into the center of the foil.
6. Place cups in freezer.
7. To remove pops, take off foil and tear away cup. Enjoy!

Variation: To make layered juice pops, make two batches of mix from different-colored grapes. Fill cups half full with one color, cover and then insert the stick and freeze. Then fill with the remaining color and freeze again.
